NAVIGATING COVID-19 CONVERSATIONS

## WHAT ARE OUR NAVIGATORS HEARING?

"Will I need a booster shot? Is this a third dose?"



### SOURCES SAY:

The vaccines have shown to work incredibly well at keeping people safe from serious illness and death. However, as time goes on there are two reasons someone might receive a third shot:

**Additional dose after a primary vaccine series:** For those who have weaker immune systems, the first two shots might not have been enough to protect them in the first place. These "immunocompromised" folks need a third shot to protect them from getting seriously sick or dying from COVID-19.

**Booster dose:** For everyone else, the protection they received from their first two shots may decrease over time. These folks may need a third shot to get them back to that original place of high protection against serious illness and death from COVID-19.

It is important to know that right now, the booster is being considered for 8 months since the second Pfizer or Moderna vaccines. We are still awaiting guidance for those who received the Johnson&Johnson vaccine.

# SENSITIVE CONVERSATIONS

You're talking to a community member who has not yet been vaccinated. They ask you about the booster shots and make a comment such as: "Why do we need a third shot if we already have two doses? Maybe they should have taken their time getting the science right the first time around."

#### How do you respond?

#### **HELPFUL TIPS FOR RESPONDING**

- Listen to and understand their concerns with empathy and sensitivity.
- Respond to their concerns in a helpful way.
- Ask permission to share what you know.

You might say: "Like you, many people weren't expecting to need a booster dose of the vaccine, but we've learned more about how long the protection from these vaccines last. Would you like to hear more about what I know?"

7-Day Average Counts for COVID-19 Cases, Hospitalizations, and Deaths



The data displayed contains citywide daily counts of deaths, cases, and hospitalizations. Deaths are aggregated by the date of death, cases are aggregated by the date of diagnosis, and hospitalizations are aggregated by the date of admission. To address variation in the numbers of deaths, cases, and hospitalizations, the data displays the daily 7-day average (mean).
